June 3, 1943 - December 1, 2023

Frederick Frank Klapproth, 80, of Ocean Township, NJ, passed away on December 1, 2023, after a sudden illness. He was born on June 3, 1943, to Adolf and Josephine Klapproth, and raised in Ridgewood, Queens, New York. After obtaining his Master of Science in Electrical Engineering at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, Fred accepted a position as a Systems Engineer at Bell Labs in Holmdel, New Jersey and pursued a career in the telecommunications industry.

In his retirement, Fred joined the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary where he held various positions, including Flotilla Commander. He exhibited his passion for educating others by teaching classes on boat safety. Community minded, Fred also was a volunteer with Meals on Wheels.

Family was the center of Fred's world. He is survived by his loving wife, Maureen Klapproth, and their three daughters, Carolyn Newcomb (Brian), Joanna Swaun, and Bethany Sanders (Tim) and his sisters, Jane Patterson and Linda Studer. Fred's love will live on through his seven grandchildren, each a testament to the values he instilled.
